## **Pinckney Police Department**

We often see snow in December so we would like to remind you of the following: **Snow on Sidewalks -**

Per ordinance 92.62, no person owning or occupying any lot or premises abutting upon any street in the village shall permit sidewalks in front of the lot or premises to become obstructed by snow, ice, debris or dirt so as to inconvenience public traffic. The snow or ice may NOT remain on the sidewalks more than 24 hours after it has fallen or accumulated. If you don't shovel your sidewalks, the Village will do it for you AT THE EXPENSE OF THE PROPERTY OWNER.

#### Snow emergencies -

In the event of large snowfall, the Village of Pinckney may declare a snow emergency. No vehicles will be allowed to park on the street in order to allow DPW to safely plow the streets.



For snow shoveling violations, we hand out red door hangers as warning, but after one warning, property owners will be fined and the snow and/or ice will be removed at the owner's expense. (NOTE: property owners will only be warned once per winter season) We do this ONLY because it is important to everyone's safety that the sidewalks are kept clear. We don't want anyone to slip and fall and we don't want kids to have to be in the street because there is so much snow and ice where they wait for the school bus. We also ask that you please be thoughtful and look out for our elderly and disabled neighbors. If you are able, please lend a helping hand of kindness.

"FLUSHABLE" WIPES ARE NOT FLUSHABLE!!! Wipes of any sort should NOT be put into our wastewater system.

They do not break down and they damage the equipment. Remember – no wipes down the pipes!

## Fall Leaf Pick Up

<u>Weekly Leaf Pick Up begins Tuesday, October 10 and will be every Tuesday and Wednesday through the end of November.</u>

Leaves must be raked into a row on the edge of the street. Allow a one-foot space between the curb and leaves to allow water run-off; **DO NOT BLOCK STORM DRAINS**. On streets with no curb, the leaves must be placed on the pavement edge, not the road shoulder. Rows should be no wider than four feet. LEAVES THAT ARE ON OR BEHIND THE CURB OR BEYOND THIS AREA CANNOT BE PICKED UP AS THE EQUIPMENT WON'T REACH. *EXCEPT*: Residents on Main Street (M-36), please keep your leaves behind the curb.

THE LEAVES CANNOT BE MIXED WITH ANY OTHER MATERIAL, SUCH AS TRASH, BRUSH OR ROCKS. If leaves are mixed with other material they will **not** be picked up. Material other than leaves can cause significant damage to equipment.

Vehicles must not be parked along the curb or in the Village right-of-way in areas where leaves are to be picked up. The leaf vacuum and truck cannot move in and out around vehicles parked in the street. If there are vehicles parked in the street, leaves in that area will not be picked up.

Please keep leaves 4 feet away from poles, mailboxes, street signs and fire hydrants as the leaf vacuum and truck cannot move in and out around these obstacles.

Leaves can be hosed down to prevent blowing if needed.

## What is Happening in the Village?

#### **NEW TRUSTEES**

Stop by a Council meeting to meet our two new trustees – Kayla Dombrowski and Shawn Tibus. Dombrowski and Titus were appointed to fill vacancies left by resignations. Their terms run until November 2018. Council meetings are the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Mondays of most months at 7 pm, downstairs in Council Chambers.









Trail fans may already have notice these pavement markings, called "sharrows," (share+arrows) on North Howell, North Mill, and Hamburg. They serve a double purpose of indicating where auto traffic should share the roadway with bicycles, and helping cyclists from the Lakelands Trail who may be unfamiliar with the area to find the downtown shops, restaurants, and the Square where they can take a little break from their trek. While we don't have strong concerns about traffic volumes on these streets, the sharrows are a good reminder for drivers to share the road with human-powered vehicles in the area. They look pretty cool too!

Be on the lookout for the Huron River Watershed Council's 2018 calendar. The Boy Scouts will be delivering them by year's end.
